## Town Hosts 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Historic Preservation Symposium

The Town of Bluffton is hosting its third annual historic preservation symposium Thursday, May 31 at 5: 30 p.m. at the Historic Campbell Chapel AME Church (23 Boundary Street). The symposium, "The Bluffton Historic District: This Place Has History," will bring together historic preservation organizations, residents, students, business owners and Town leaders to discuss the importance of preservation. This event is free and all are welcome.

The event will begin with a "Meet and Greet" with representatives of local historic preservation organizations at 5: 30 p.m. A moderated speaker panel will be from 6 p.m. – 7: 30 p.m. The two featured speakers will be Michael Bedenbaugh, executive director of Preservation South Carolina, and Dr. Emory Campbell, a Gullah Culture consultant of Gullah Heritage Consulting Services. The local historic preservation organizations participating in the "Meet and Greet" include: the Bluffton Historical Preservation Society, A Call to Action, Celebrate Bluffton, Bluffton Township Black History Historical Preservation Society, Palmetto Bluff Conservancy and the Cultural District. Come learn from historians and historic preservation experts about the history, culture, and preservation of Gullah Heritage and what new initiatives preservationists are using to help save endangered places in South Carolina.
