IRS Scam

In the last several weeks, the Bluffton Police Department has received complaints from residents regarding a phone scam.

The scam involves a person calling a home, cell phone or business, and saying they represent the IRS. The person then tells the resident they owe back taxes, and if it isn’t paid, an officer will arrest them. The scammer then states the late balance can be settled by buying an iTunes or Target gift card in the amount owed.

“What is concerning, somehow the Bluffton Police Department phone number is appearing on the residents’ caller IDs who are receiving these calls. We want the public to know the Bluffton Police Department will not call you on behalf of another agency and threaten to arrest you if a payment isn’t made,” said Bluffton Police Chief Joey Reynolds.

According to IRS.gov the IRS will never:

- 1) Call to demand immediate payment.
- 2) Demand you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount.
- 3) Require you to use specific payment method.
- 4) Threaten to bring in local police or other law enforcement groups to make an arrest.




Autumn is a time for football, cooler weather and shortening days; but it is also the time to perform some simple maintenance tasks to insure we all continue to stay safe. This is also a good time to inventory any safety kits, such travel kits.

Home: Prune shrubbery away from windows before foliage blocks windows. Change your smoke alarm batteries.

Out and About: Drive safely, use your headlights since it is getting dark earlier each day. Lock all car doors and hide all items in trunk out of plain view. Make sure you are not encumbered with a large number of items. Women, carry your purse as close to your body as possible, no dangling straps. Men, carry your wallet in front pants pocket. Do not travel alone.

Recreation: Cyclists should lock bikes up and wear reflective safety equipment. Register your bike in case it is stolen or lost. Boaters should check their equipment and make sure it is serviceable and working properly.

Businesses: Ensure an uncluttered and well lit view from the outside. Ensure staff has an unobstructed view of customers and they should know proper procedures if they spot a shoplifter. Train staff to recognize counterfeit currency, credit cards, and false ID's. **NO UNDERAGE SALES!!!** Excess cash should be transferred from registers frequently. Cash registers should be emptied every night. The money in the registers should be counted in a secure area out of view of customers. Surveillance cameras should be serviced and maintained regularly. Parking lots should be well lit and maintained to ensure customer safety.

The safety checks are available from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. the last Thursday of the month. **No appointment is necessary.**

While the FBINAA provides training opportunities for those in law enforcement, it also provides members to share ideas, techniques, and experiences.

"This is a huge accomplishment for Chief Reynolds. It's a reflection of his talents as a law enforcement officer and how he leads the men and women who protect us," said Bluffton Mayor Lisa Sulka.

The FBINAA was created in 1935.
